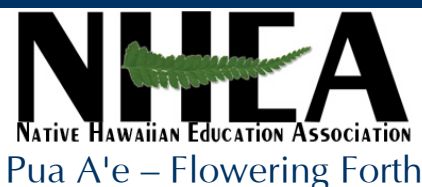

Deadline: Advance registrations must be postmarked by March 11, 2005.

Payment: Form of payment must accompany registration. Credit card numbers submitted with registration payment will be processed upon receipt. Registrations will not be processed without payment.

Purchase Orders: Government and company purchase orders with authorized signature will be accepted and must accompany the registration form. Participants registering by purchase order will be billed for nonattendance unless notification of withdrawal is made by March 15, 2005.

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HUAKA'I

On the afternoon of Day 2 (March 22, 2005), you will have the option of attending either the Cultural Arts Treasures or one of the *huaka'i* (field trips) listed below.

CHOICE	DESCRIPTION
A	Pu`uokapolei and the Native Plant and Cultural Garden: Shad Kane, retired police officer and current President of 'Ahaui Siwila Hawai'i O Kapolei Civic Club, will be leading a tour of Pu`uokapolei and the living lei of native plants and cultural resources that circle it. Shad will share the history of Pu`uokapolei as it was used in pre-contact days as an astrological and sacred site. This will be a 20 minute bus ride to Kapolei and some easy walking is involved. Attendees should dress comfortably and wear walking shoes.
B	History and Mo'olelo of Keahi and Kūpaka: Aunty Arline Eaton, kupuna at Iroquois Elementary School, will be sharing the history of the area known as Pu`uloa (currently known as Pearl Harbor and Iroquois Point). Born at a lū'au, she was reared by her grandparents in the area known at Keahi and Kūpaka (both considered the Iroquois Point/'Ewa area). During those days, transportation was by canoe and bartering was the normal way food and other things were acquired. Aunty Arline will share the history of the area and why some say there are 13 ahupua'a and others say there are 15. She will also provide some instructional ways to use the area as a sense of place with song, history and mo'olelo. Be advised that people should dress comfortably. There will be a short bus ride to Iroquois Point.
C	Sense of Place-Leeward Community College Area: Uncle Tin Hu Young, born and reared in the site that Leeward Community College now stands, will share the history of the area from pre-Kamehameha days until the present. His family has lived in the area for generations and has seen the geography and use of the land change. Did you know that a he'iau existed on a mound near the campus parking lot? Currently the volunteer archivist and one of the trustees for Kawaiha'o Church, he will also share mo'olelo of the area and of the families that lived the area and rose to prominence. This will be a walking tour of the campus, particularly around the area overlooking Pearl Harbor. Be advised to dress comfortably and wear walking shoes.
D	Oneula Beach Park Limu Project: The limu project is located at Oneula Beach Park on the Ewa Coast of O'ahu. This non-profit organization was started by Walter Kamana'a and Henry Chang Wo. Their goal is to restore ocean life to the area and to return the eco-system to what it was before reckless harvesting destroyed it. Our visit to the limu project will be broken down into two small groups: one weaves a haku lei of limu, while the other group goes on a beach walk to learn more about limu and the ocean. Uncle Henry will focus on why we lost limu, what we have now, and how we can prevent it from further destruction.
