Nā Honua Maui Ola

Nā Honua Maui Ola (NHMO) was developed and published by the Native Hawaiian Education Council and in partnership with Ka Haka 'Ula O Ke'elikōlani College of Hawaiian Language, University of Hawai'i at Hilo, March 2002. This publication was created as Hawai'i Guidelines for Culturally Healthy and Responsive Learning Environments, built upon the template of the Alaska Standards for Culturally Responsive Schools through partnership with the Alaska Native Knowledge Network. This undertaking was received from numerous Hawaiian organizations, agencies and educational institutions and organizations serving Hawaiians at the community, state and national levels. During the conference, a revised publication NHMO II will be shared. They will highlight the 8 identified Cultural Pathways and a panel of young Hawaiian scholars, whose voices and mana'ō reflect the wisdom of these elders in their work and everyday teaching practices, will discuss how to implement these Pathways.

MAKAHIKI CURRICULUM (HAWAIIAN LANGUAGE VERSION)

This workshop will be presented entirely in the Hawaiian language. Presenters will cover the suite of materials (student textbook, Instructors' Guide, multimedia components, and 10 posters of traditional Hawaiian games) and demonstrate the use of the materials for classroom instruction. The materials are designed to target grades 4 and 7 but can be adapted to lower elementary and secondary as well. Participants should be able to read and speak the Hawaiian language to attend. Upon completion of the workshop participants will be able to take with them a set of the Makahiki materials for their classroom use. The workshop is limited to 25 participants. 2 Hour Presentation
